At the beginning of June I traveled to Green Lake, WI for our denomination's Wisconsin Conference Annual Meeting. While the keynote speakers are always good and I enjoy the privilege of having a voice and vote on issues at the business meetings the real highlight of this weekend for me has always been the various workshops. Whether you are passionate about music and worship, biblical studies, mission and outreach, the future of our denomination, camp and outdoor ministries, there is always something offered that is sure to pique your interest. This year I found myself drawn to workshops that talked about stewardship of our physical health (and how to live longer and healthier lives) and about "the spiritual practice of enough". One of the great takeaways of these workshops for me was the importance of caring for myself both physically and spiritually. This is not about being selfish but about maintaining oneself in order to be able to provide quality care for the people and churches I serve. Honesty is important and I must be honest in saying that I struggle, at times, in my obedience to the commandment of Sabbath listed in the Ten Commandments (Exodus 20:8-11 and Deuteronomy 5:12-15). In my desire to meet the needs of others and offer my best to both churches I sometimes fall into the trap of thinking I must be constantly working, constantly striving to do more and more. The reality is that all this does is become a physical and emotional drain, and can lend to the false belief that it is all up to me, rather than to rest in God's provision. So I hope you will be hearing me talk about Sabbath more in the future. What this means is that I am committing myself to take the fourth commandment seriously, to set aside one day of each week for rest and renewal (typically this will be Thursday or Friday, as church needs dictate). This does not mean I am not available in an emergency...I will most certainly be checking my messages and responding to any urgent needs. But it means I might not answer my phone right away, and non-emergency emails and phone calls will be returned the next day.

Sabbath is not a luxury, but a necessity, a call to trust in God and to recognize that we are truly to be "human beings" not merely "human doings". It is to recognize that God is the one in control and that it is God who provides. All week long we work and strive, and so on one day of the week we are called to slow down, to reflect on the goodness of God, to recharge and renew




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ourselves with God's grace. And Sabbath-keeping isn't just for pastors; all God's people are called to obey these words and recognize and respond to God's creative work in our lives. Sabbath is not to be a burden or drudgery but a gift, another example of God's abundant grace and desire for us to live life with joy. In the gospels we often read of Jesus taking time away from his ministry to pray and rest. There is no one way to keep Sabbath...and as Jesus said "the Sabbath was made for humankind, not humankind for the Sabbath" (Mark 2:27). What matters is using the time to refresh yourself, to enjoy the goodness of God.

Now, admittedly, as one prone to saying "yes" to every request made of my time and my energy, the observance of Sabbath can be a challenge. It can even cause anxiety over what is left undone. But as Richard Carlson wrote in his best-selling book Don't Sweat the Small Stuff, there will always be things in our life left unfinished, things that must be left for another day. But this is one of those journeys that we can share with one another, speaking of the joys and the challenges of being faithful to this command. As I commit myself to this practicing of keeping Sabbath, I invite you to join me on the journey, let's hold one another accountable. I welcome your responses and reflections as you keep Sabbath in your own life. For those interested in reading more on the subject of Sabbath keeping, there have been a number of excellent books and articles written on the subject. Stop by my study and I would be happy to share these resources with you.

CAPUCHIN'S RUN/WALK FOR THE HUNGRY



WISCONSIN CONFERENCE UCC ANNUAL MEETING 2014

- -Celebration of the 20th Anniversary of Wisconsin's Lay Academy. Lay Academy is a program of courses available to lay people that assists participants in deepening their faith and knowledge of church and scripture, grow in spiritual maturity, and strengthen Christ's church.
- -Voted to become an Open and Affirming Conference. For those unfamiliar with this terminology: "Open and Affirming (ONA) is the United Church of Christ's (UCC) designation for congregations, campus ministries, and other bodies in the UCC which make a public covenant of welcome into their full life and ministry to persons of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions." http://www.ucc.org/lgbt/ona.html. This means that our conference office will not discriminate and will actively welcome individuals who are gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender in all of its conference level operations. While this does not directly affect our individual congregations it is a powerful witness to the call for us to treat all people as beloved children of God.
- -Amazingly informative keynote speakers and workshops (see the pastor's letter to learn more about a few of these workshops).
- -Update on search for new conference minister.
- -Approval of the 2015 conference budget of \$2,151,751 which included \$409,000 in National Basic Support to the UCC, \$53,672 to the Wisconsin Council Health & Human Services ministry, and over \$150,000 in support of Higher education (which includes money to Lakeland College and Northland College here in Wisconsin). Butter Horns

Recipe donated by Polly Weber

This was served during Fellowship on October 13th, 2013

Ingredients:

4 cups flour

1 cake of yeast, only! (purchase

in refrigerated section in store)

4 eggs yolks

1 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp. salt

1 ½ cup butter

1 cup sour cream

Powder sugar for sprinkling

Filling:

4 egg whites; beaten

1 cup sugar

1 tsp. vanilla

1 ½ cup finely ground nuts

Sift flour, salt, and crumble the yeast together. Cut in butter with cutter. Blend in egg yolks,

sour cream, and vanilla. Divide dough into fifths and chill one hour. Sprinkle rolling pin and board with powder sugar. Roll out thin; into circular shape size of round dinner plate, cover with filling and cut into 8 wedges and roll up into the shape of a horn. Bake @ 375 degrees for 15 minutes. Frost with a butter frosting.

COMMENTARY: IN AN UNEVEN WORLD, WHAT DOES SOLIDARITY MEAN?

I recently returned from a trip visiting international partners in Haiti. On the flight to Port au Prince, passengers boarding in matching t-shirts made it evident that the plane leaving Atlanta was full of church groups going on mission trips. One t-shirt read "GO.LOVE.HAITI!" Another, with the words emblazoned on a cross, said "Mission to the Least of These." When my wife and I lived and worked in South Africa, we would see the same phenomenon on planes bound for Johannesburg, many of the shirts referring to the need to "save" Africa.

These group journeys to help others, matching t-shirts and all, may be easy targets for us to mock. But I wonder if we mainline Protestants are that different? At Global Ministries, we partner with international churches and organizations in relationships of mutuality and solidarity. In addition, we have the opportunity to work with many churches and individuals in North America who want to make a difference in the world. And there is no doubt that this desire comes from our calling to follow God and to work for a world of justice and peace. But it is also evident that, due to our privilege as North Americans, many times we see ourselves as "doers" and agents of change, making it difficult to experience solidarity and learn from these relationships.

When we meet with international partners, one of the most important lessons we can learn is how U.S. political, economic, and military policies affect the lives of the most vulnerable. During the visit to Haiti, one of the comments we heard over and over is how Western aid, especially after the 2010 earthquake, has actually served to undermine Haiti's ability to respond to the many issues currently facing the country. The Rev. Patrick Villier, president of the National Spiritual Council of Churches of Haiti (CONASPEH), noted that true partnership is not about building independence in either Haiti or the United States, but should instead be rooted in our mutual interdependence.

Similarly, in Solidarity Ethics, Rebecca Todd Peters writes that while international partnerships usually begin by focusing on the needs and poverty of others, they instead need to start with the reality of privilege that many of us in the West take for granted. She goes on to note that "because a first-world ethic of solidarity begins from a position of privilege rather than a position of marginalization, analyzing and understanding privilege must be its starting point."

Yes, there are needs around the world. And yes, God calls us to minister to the "least of these." But when our solidarity with others begins with the premise of their poverty, it is very difficult for us to relate in any form other than donors or patrons. We must begin to understand that in a globalized world, it is not always our direct assistance or direction that others need. Rather we must recognize that our culture of hyper

individualism and over consumption is tied, both directly and indirectly, to the social realities and deprivations faced by millions around the world (including here in the United States). If we begin with our privilege as the starting point so that we might be encouraged to fight for change here, we may just have a chance at realizing relationships of mutuality and interdependence in our globalized and uneven world. And we don't even need matching t-shirts to do that.
